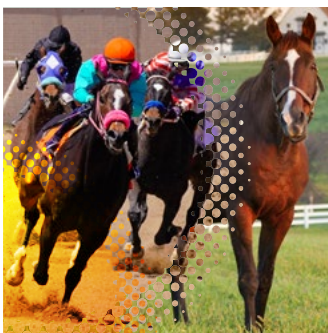


8:00 a.m. Celebrating 10 Years: The Games That Transformed Alltech and Kentucky
